TOPIC: Types of sentences	INTRODUCTION ACTIVITY:  To begin the lesson, a simple declarative sentence will be written on the board. The tone of this sentence will be changed by switching out the punctuation. Some great examples include: I have a hat. I like ice cream.  Next, the period at the end of the sentence will be changed to a question mark. Students will be asked to share their thoughts on how the question mark changes the meaning of the sentence.  Then, the question mark will be changed into an exclamation point. Again, students will be asked how this changes the meaning of the sentence.  Students will be explained that the meaning of a sentence is determined by the type of sentence format used to write it.  Students will be told that they will be learning about the four different types of sentences today. T class will be asked for volunteers to list the different types of sentences.
